

This is about art and about history, but it is not art history. Let's be foot loose and fancy free, and just follow our feet from one imaginary gallery to another, from one museum to another, to an astonishing building here and a surprising home or factory there. Without any boundaries of time or space, let's enjoy the work of creative people, one by one, asking ourselves how the font of human ingenuity is opened and nourished and fulfilled. The imagined gallery we visit for this class will be that of color and design theorist Paul Klee. **Michael R. Kapetan** is an artist whose own work is informed by the scientific, the aesthetic, and the spiritual as he creates holy images for churches, synagogues, and temples, plus unique solar sculptures that mark the turning of the seasons. Mike is retired from the University of Michigan's School of Art. He holds a degree in art history from Harvard University, and a master's degree in sculpture from the University of Michigan.

AA02 The Art of David Barr: Making Visible the Invisible

David Barr's sculptures span the globe. Like the towering steel arc of *Transcending* in Detroit's Hart Plaza, each individual sculpture expresses the uniqueness of a place. Taken together they "form an invisible filigree of connective links, filigree that embraces people in the past, present and future." Ken will examine each of David Barr's global projects as works of art that give form to patterns which nurture and connect humanity in science, geography, culture, and aesthetics. He will include an introductory tour of David Barr's Michigan Legacy Art Park (MLAP) and Villa Barr Art Park. Frequent presenter **Ken Stevens** is professor emeritus at Eastern Michigan University, former president of MLAP, and education advisor to Villa Barr and MLAP.

Diego Rivera, the greatest of the Mexican muralists, called the fresco cycle he painted in the Detroit Institute of Arts (DIA) his "finest work." We will look in depth at the Detroit Industry murals, and also at other works by Diego Rivera, as we explore his style, his life, and his ideas, using detailed illustrations. **Wendy Evans** was raised among the museums of London, England, and holds an advanced degree from Oxford University. She has taught art history at Wayne State University and other institutions in Michigan and is a long-time docent volunteer at the Detroit Institute of Arts. Wendy is known fondly for her British accent and crazy socks, and for the passion for art she loves to share with others in her richly illustrated presentations.

Just over 52 years ago, in 1972, the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) designated as World Heritage Sites more than a thousand locations valued for their outstanding cultural and/or natural significance to humanity. The sites designated by UNESCO include archaeological excavations, masterpieces of religious or secular architecture, and monumental sculpture. This class revisits six Elderwise favorites, adopted from *The Great Courses* series, featuring lectures by Justin M. Jacobs of American University, and breathtaking visuals from some of the most outstanding World Heritage Sites.

CU05 Bojagi: Hand Stitched Patchwork

Clothing production today is one of the most polluting industries on the planet. However, not long ago it was a mindful, functional, and climate friendly cottage industry. Today there is a small slow-fashion revolution taking place to combat the ever-growing fast-fashion industry by returning to these traditional techniques. In this class we will look at some of the ways designers and artisans are slowing down clothing production. We will learn how to be part of this movement with a simple Korean hand stitched patchwork technique called Bojagi (also called Jogakbo or Pojagi). We will use fabric scraps to create a small sampler that can be expanded into a pillow cover, a cafe curtain, a gift wrap, a scarf, or a simple garment. All supplies will be provided. **Matthew Addonizio** is the son of Joan Bulmer, a longtime Elderwise member, from whom he inherited this creative curiosity. He is a designer and multimedia artist in Philadelphia. He attended Kalamazoo College and has been working in fiber arts professionally for the past four years. His eponymous label (Matthew Addonizio LLC) and his fabric import company (Approved Textiles LLC) work with artisan communities in India and Africa to produce fabric and clothing using traditional hand craft techniques.

CU06 The Soul of Southeast Asia

Southeast Asia in 2023 is a world very different from ours in terms of cultures, languages, beliefs, foods, and people. In Phnom Penh, Cambodia, we see the Royal Palace complex and its Khmer-style architecture. The classic art of Apsara dancing introduces us to the ancient civilizations at Angkor Wat and Angkor Thom, whose stunning ruins speak of a glorious distant past. The Killing Fields site is dedicated to the memory of those who lost their lives during the Khmer Rouge regime. In Thailand we see the elaborate temples of the Grand Palace in Bangkok as well as the ruined palaces of Ayutthaya, the former capital. Laos is a mountainous and scenically beautiful country where old ways predominate over modernity. A Mekong River cruise brings us to a remote village to learn how local people live. Finally, in Vietnam, we board a classic junk to explore the breathtaking scenery of Ha Long Bay. In bustling Hanoi, we view a Water Puppet performance and enjoy a bicycle/rickshaw ride through the thriving streets and marketplaces of the city's Old Quarter. **George Jabol** received his B.A. degree from Muskingum College in Ohio, and a Ph.D. in English language and literature from the University of Michigan. Fully retired now from a career with the federal government, George creates photographic slide shows as a way to remember his travels and share them with others.

You will be delighted and inspired by *Iris*, an Albert Maysles documentary made in 2014 about Iris Apfel, a Manhattan cultural icon and self–proclaimed geriatric starlet. Movie critic Manohla Dargis of *The Times* called the documentary an "insistent rejection of monocultural conformity" and "a delightful eye–opener about life, love, statement eyeglasses, bracelets the size of tricycle tires, and the art of making the grandest of entrances." A juicy group discussion will follow the film which runs for 1 hour, 19 minutes. Feel free to wear something fabulous! **Linda Gintowt** holds an M.A. in drama from the University of Toronto. She has a passion for history and the preservation of art and culture. Linda served as the Elderwise Program Coordinator for five years.

CU08 Saddle Weavers of the Gobi Desert

"You must wear something colorful when you ride a camel." said Mary Underwood's Mongolian friend, Bodio, before Mary's first trip to the Gobi Desert. Willing or not, one does make a statement when suspended seven feet off of the ground! Some eight years later, during the week of Tsagaan Sar (the Mongolian new year), Mary traveled again to the Gobi with her friend for a camel festival and to study with a renowned camel saddle weaver. In this class Mary opens the doors of our imagination to the world of camel fibers, camel husbandry and racing, and to how a camel saddle is created. Join us as she treats us to a glimpse of Mongolian life and culture from her travels around that country. **Mary Underwood** is a hand spinner and weaver who works with natural fibers. Her yarns and weaving are intended for functional use, for apparel, or the home. She is a member of local, state, and international weaving guilds and groups. Her interests extend to those who grow, raise, prepare, and dye the fibers and yarns she uses. Mary's constant thirst for adventure has led to multiple trips to Mongolia to ride horses and document the textile traditions there.

Families in Berlin are terrorized by repeated murders of children, with the city's police unable to trace the killer. This movie brought stardom to Peter Lorre for his role as the elusive murderer. These German-language films have been beautifully restored with added music and English subtitles. **John Stewart** is a retired software developer with degrees in biology from the University of Michigan. He is not a movie maven, but he enjoys films with a foreign touch, and he believes these two will appeal to Elderwise cinema lovers.

"We Can Do It" became the rallying cry for millions of women during World War II who had, until this time period, never envisioned working on an industrial assembly line building weapons of war. Rosie the Riveter was the star of a campaign aimed at recruiting female workers for defense industries, and she became an iconic image of working women. Join Claire Kitchin Dahl of the Michigan Flight Museum at Willow Run, to learn the incredible history of the Willow Run B-24 Bomber Plant and the teamwork of the powerful Detroit automotive industry. Claire will share the dramatic and vital roles played by women as they showed the nation that they were willing and able to fill the work force gaps caused by men going into military service. This class is in partnership with a tour at the Michigan Flight Museum on Wednesday, October 9 (see TO54 Women Answer the Call). Claire Kitchin Dahl began her teaching career in 1971, and retired from Ann Arbor Pioneer High School in 2009. HI13 John Brown: The Road to Harpers Ferry

On October 16, 1859, John Brown and 21 of his followers invaded Harpers Ferry, Virginia. They took possession of the federal armory and arsenal there as part of an attempt to end the institution of slavery. Captured two days later, Brown was tried and convicted of treason, murder, and inciting a slave insurrection. He was hanged on December 2, 1859. Because of his actions, southern states began to arm and eventually to secede from the union. Many historians consider Brown's actions to have been a catalyst for the Civil War, and 165 years later he remains a controversial figure. Was he a hero, a fanatic, a terrorist, a martyr, a "crazy old coot"? A look at John Brown's life during the years leading up to the Harpers Ferry raid provides some possible answers to these questions.

Peggy Russo holds a Ph.D. in English language and Literature from the University of Michigan. After 30 years of teaching at Pennsylvania State University, she retired and returned to Ann Arbor. She is co-editor (with Paul Finkelman) of Terrible Swift Sword: The Legacy of John Brown.

We will examine the specific details of the Fitzgerald's final journey, a journey that ultimately took the lives of all 29 crew members. We will also discuss a summary of the investigation that followed this tragic event, and the multiple theories about what caused the ship to sink so suddenly, without any distress calls. **Ray Stocking** is a life-long admirer of the Great Lakes shipping industry. He grew up along the shores of Lake St. Clair and spent his childhood years watching and learning about the "big freighters" as they passed by. Ray is a graduate of Eastern Michigan University where he received his B.B.A and M.B.A. degrees in business management.

The Michigan Innocence Clinic at the University of Michigan Law School was created in 2009 as the first exclusively non–DNA innocence clinic in the country. Clinic attorneys and law students work to investigate and litigate claims of innocence made by people convicted of crimes in Michigan in cases where DNA evidence is not available. In its first 15 years, the Clinic's work has resulted in the release of 42 people whose combined wrongful incarceration totalled more than 700 years. Professor Syed will discuss recent victories secured by the Innocence Clinic, as well as some interesting ongoing cases in which the Clinic is involved. **Imran Syed**, Co-Director of the Michigan Innocence Clinic, holds a JD and an undergraduate degree in political science from the University of Michigan. He joined the Michigan Innocence Clinic as a law student in 2009, and has been an attorney at the clinic for over 13 years. Imran specializes in forensic science-based litigation and also teaches an independent course in forensic science for law students. In 2017, the American Bar Association named him one of the Top 40 Young Lawyers in the country and in 2016, the State Bar of Michigan recognized him with the Regeana Myrick Outstanding Young Lawyer of the Year Award.

In 2018, over 60% of Michigan voters approved a state constitutional amendment to take the power to draw federal and state election district lines away from the legislature and put that power in the hands of a 13-member Independent Citizens Redistricting Commission (MICRC). Margaret Leary will describe how for 40 years, Michigan became one of the most gerrymandered states in the United States, what gerrymandering is, how the proposal got on the ballot, the main features of the MICRC, the steps to creating the final new district lines in time for the November 2022 elections, challenges to the Commission's work, and the response to a federal court's finding that the state house and senate lines in the Detroit area had to be corrected.

Margaret A. Leary received a B.A. from Cornell University, an M.A. from the University of Minnesota, another from Eastern Michigan University, and a J.D. from the William Mitchell College of Law. She taught at the University of Michigan Law School, and was director of the university's Law Library from 1984 to 2011.

Alzheimer's disease was first described by the German neuropathologist Alois Alzheimer in 1906. Today, it is regarded as the most common form of dementia. We will learn about the latest findings from this year's Alzheimer's Association International Conference and several other recent conferences where new information is being presented, including information on risk factors, early detection, innovative prevention and treatment approaches, and new initiatives to support research.

Bruno Giordani is a professor at the University of Michigan in the Departments of Psychiatry, Neurology, and Psychology, and in the School of Nursing. Dr. Giordani currently serves as Associate Director of the Michigan Alzheimer's Disease Center. His research interests include identification of early signs of cognitive impairment and cross-cultural applications of new assessment and intervention models.

This is the tale of one of the biggest personalities in 19th century astronomy and his journey through astronomical success and earthly blunder. **Austin Edmister** serves as assistant director for astronomy at the Detroit Observatory. Austin holds a B.S. in physics from the University of Illinois, Urbana–Champaign and an M.S. in astrophysics from Michigan State University. He has over a decade of experience using telescopes and planetariums to teach about the wonders of the night sky.

In this class Philip Hughes will lead us through the science that lets astronomers explore a Universe so vast that light from the most distant objects seen today began its journey before the Sun and Earth had formed. We will start by introducing Kepler's Laws, which enable us to map the Solar System, and to "weigh" the objects within it. The same approach allows us to "weigh" stars. Philip will then show how the light from stars holds the secret of their composition and structure, providing new tools for calculating the distance to remote galaxies: the so-called "distance ladder." The final item in our toolbox is the Doppler effect, enabling us to measure the speed with which objects approach, or recede from, Earth. Pulling all this together enables us to build a picture of the Universe — from the Big Bang to the formation of planets, stars and galaxies — and to predict its ultimate fate! **Philip Hughes** teaches in the Department of Astronomy at the University of Michigan. His research focuses on the high-energy particles and magnetic fields in the jets of plasma associated with supermassive black holes in galaxies.

Life histories of tarantulas present an interesting dichotomy. Sedentary females live in the same burrows for up to 25 years, whereas males reach sexual maturity in 7 to 8 years and spend the last few months of their lives actively searching for, and mating with, as many females as possible. Despite a very robust pet trade, surprisingly little is known about these animals in their natural environments. In this presentation Cara Shillington will introduce us to the fascinating world of spiders, with a focus on tarantulas. She will discuss what she and her students are learning at their current field site in southern Colorado. Join us with any spider questions you may have and prepare to enjoy an up-close encounter with live tarantulas. **Cara Shillington** is a professor of biology at Eastern Michigan University (EMU) whose area of expertise is behavioral and physiological ecology. She teaches invertebrate biology at EMU, and has led students on field trips to tropical and subtropical localities in Florida, the Bahamas, and Ecuador. Her research focuses on the arachnids, especially tarantulas, using these creatures as both model and muse.
